Your letter was duly received & would have been answered before this, had I not been very sick with the ague & fever. I wrote you on the receipt of your letter containing the \$25, & cannot account for your not getting it.

In answer to your first letter, I can only say we have no particular interest here on the subject of religion, but there are some who are going onward & upward in the good old way. ~~The~~ regard to the success of our agents; it was poor; bro. Wilson went to the West & got about \$100. & bro. Henson to the South & did not get enough to pay his expenses. Bro. Wilson now at the West & bro. Henson goes in a few days.

The Ex. Com. are talking of having bro. Henson go to England after next harvest but there is no certainty of his going; but should he go, I will let <sup>you</sup> know in time, so that you may write by him. The colored man who is collecting money in Eng. is a Mr. Dorsey, sent out by the N. E. Church of London. He is a man of good character & was regularly delegated by his church to get aid, but since he left this country, the church ~~has~~
